EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report covers the calendar year January 1st to December 31st, 2021 which marks the first year of implementation of the NFM-3 TASO Global Fund Grant. USTP aims to achieve and sustain the NTLP case finding and cure rate targets and to provide accurate information about TB and the fight against TB. In addition, USTP exist to mobilize the Civil Society Organizations, communities and Private Health Providers to contribute to NSP overall goal of this NTLP Strategic Plan 2020/21-2024/25 is to reduce the incidence of TB by 20% from 200/100,000 population in 2019/20 to 160/100,000 Population by 2024/25.

USTP is a platform for coordination of agencies and stakeholders to contribute to the fight against TB. The organization exist to maintain relationship and subscribe to objectives of the Global Stop TB Partnership and it help promote advocacy, communication and social mobilization for TB Control and Prevention in the country.

USTP program team were engaged in a number of activities in 2021 including setting atmosphere that was critical for USTP to kick start activity implementation under the new funding mechanism from TASO Global Fund Grant Management Unit and also the UNOPs grant that was awarded in the course of the year.

The year started by USTP team working closely with PR2 in ensuring that all the required conditions for implementation of the grants were in place and in the similar situation, USTP was very much engaged with the Global Stop TB Partnership in writing the grant proposal that eventually resulted into the award of the UNOPs grant by June 2021.

The organization supported the world TB day event for 2021 which took place in Moroto in March 24, 2021. The subsequent activities that followed World TB day event included providing mentorship to the PHPs in the 8 Municipalities/Districts. There was also CSO and TB survivor initial mentorship visits carried out across the 17 MDR-TB initiation regions in the country. The visits ensured the TB experts and CSO representatives were identified for the trainings that were also supported by USTP in the year. In this respect, USTP conducted the trainings of TB experts and CSO representatives where in total, 86 participant targets were trained on many aspects for TB community awareness and management.

There were also the TB regional level advocacy meetings/workshops conducted in 13 out of 14 target MOH regions of the country were TB issues were shared by different regional political, local, cultural and religious leaders and here, more than 650 invited participants were engaged in this meetings.

USTP was involved in a number of advocacy activities including coordinating the TB Constituency engagement meetings and the launch of UNOPs grant.

There was also the engagement of the political leaders, opinion leaders and celebrities in the civil society hearing meeting to contribute ideas to the Global civil society hearing before the 2023 UNHLM meeting.

The National level 4th TB annual conference was conducted in the year where close to 500 participants attended physically and virtually in December 2021.

The Review of the TB brochure and update the talking points and print 300 copies for the journalist and media houses was also coordinated in the reporting period.

Many other interventions supported included engaging members of parliament for their knowledge updates on TB issues, engagement of journalists and media groups among others.

The year generally was a busy one with implementation of the planned interventions amidst the covid-19 lockdown measures that were in place. But good enough, all the secretariat staff members came through the year with good health and were able to coordinate the activities that were well executed in the reporting period.

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INTRODUCTION

The report highlights the activities which were implemented by USTP from January to December, 2021, the accomplishments, challenges and the recommendations. The report also provides an overview of the planned activities for the following year -January to December, 2022.

Introductory Overview of the year 2021

The year 2021 started amidst the outbreak of C-19 rise all over the world, Uganda inclusive, with the series country's lockdowns throughout greater part of the year. This brought a lot of changes in the ways different activities had to be implemented from the planned implementation approaches.

The year 2021 began with USTP starting the implementing the new grant with PR2 with the code name UGA-C-TASO with the MOU signed on January 4th, 2021 between TASO Uganda Ltd (GMU) and Uganda Stop TB Partnership.

The different program areas coordinated by USTP during the year are summarized here below.

Support to CBOs/CSOs networks to conduct community monitoring, advocacy and social mobilization aimed at improving the poor performance TB indicators

The support to CBOs/CSOs here are aimed at improving the the poor TB TSR, low retention in care, high LTFU, poor adherence to TB and HIV medicines, poor virological suppression and high malaria incidence, treatment and care. This intervention will provide monthly facilitations to CBOs/CSOs networks in the selected districts that are lake-based (Kampala, Mukono and Wakiso in this case) and also mentorship

During the year 2021, the CBOs/CSOs networks that were visited and assessed for inclusion were into interventions were:

- ✓ Touch Namuwongo Project
- ✓ Mukono Multi-Purpose
- ✓ Kuboresha Africa-Mukono
- ✓ Kawempe Home Care
- ✓ Hope for the Future (Reach out Mbuya)
- ✓ Africa for Health Research Initiative (Kampala/Mayuge)

The initial assessment to each of these networks was followed by another OCA visits which were to the target organizations that had scores in most of the assessed indicators, and here Mukono Multi-Purpose, Kuboresha Africa-Mukono and Kawempe Home Care were chosen and thereafter, selected for the trainings by PR2. The facilitations and mentorships to these CBO/CSO networks will be conducted in the first part of year 2 (2022).


The interventions outcomes are improving institutional capacity of the CBOs/CSOs in the different areas (finance, M&E and programming), Improved TB outcomes (TSR) and also increased case notifications rates.

Conduct mentorship in the 8 municipalities where private health facilities were trained

This activity targets mentorship in the 8 municipalities where health service providers from a total of 107 private health facilities were trained on TB care and prevention using TASO-GF8NFM2 grants. The health workers trained in the municipalities of Iganga, Jinja, Masaka, Mbarara, Gulu, Kitgum,

Mbale and Tororo and supported to implement Public Private Mix (PPM) activities. In this In NFM3, the USTP had planned to conduct mentorship support visits using two (2) teams and each were to support 4 districts during every quarterly visits in order to cover the 8 district and while in the municipality each team shall support 5 trained PHFs per district, totalling 40 facilities in all the 8 municipalities.

In the year 2021, there mentorships to PHPs were conducted by two teams, each taking up 2 regions (Central and Western regions, then Eastern and East-Central regions) in the quarters 2 and 3. The first mentorship was in April 2021 and the second was in August, 2021. A total of 34 private health facilities were visited for mentorship in Q2 and 32 PHFs were mentored in Q3 of this reporting year. The plan to extend the mentorship to Gulu and Kitgum are expected to be concluded in 2022.

Coordinating PPM Oversight committee meetings to review performance

This intervention activity targets reviewing performance including policy issues, mobilize resources, carrying out advocacy, ensuring the availability of TB commodities for Private sector with the bodies like NMS, JMS, the donor-supported implementing mechanisms and the intermediary agencies.

In the reporting year 2021, there were 3 planned meetings of this nature, out which, 2 were conducted, one virtually and one physically after the lockdown restrictions of C-19 were lifted towards the end of the year. Each of this meeting was expected to engage 17 participants, so from the year 1 target of 51 participants, 44 members were engaged or 86% of the targets were involved in the Oversight committee meetings.

Training of Expert/TB survivors

This activity implemented included training and facilitating TB survivors, women and champions to sensitize communities, facilitate TB case finding and follow up of TB patients in the community. The training milestone included:

This activity was kick-started in May 2021 with the execution of the initial mentorship visits
across the country that targeted all the 17 DR-TB treatment regions. In this visits, the TB
survivors and CSOs that eventually formed the denominator for the trained participants were
selected and their contact details profiled.

- Conducting workshops to tailor/develop training materials before the training was conducted.
 There were series of virtual meetings conducted to conceptualize, draft and finalize the
 training contents for the Expert/TB survivors and CSO representatives. In total, 8 virtual
 workshops were organized and this facilitated the smooth development of the training
 contents with the final contents organized into modular formats listed here below:
 - ✓ Module1: Introduction to the Course & coverage of the interventions
 - ✓ Human Rights & Gender with respect to TB
 - ✓ Module 3: Supporting TB services in the community and at Facility
 - ✓ Module 4 : Communication for TB
 - ✓ Module 5 : Social Protection
 - ✓ Module 6: Income Generating Activities
 - ✓ Module 7: Sustainability strategies for the interventions

• There was also a national level validation meeting for invited participants to contribute, review and adapted the consolidated training contents that also included elements of social protection and the subject matters experts shall be engaged.

- The next step was conducting the actual training of Expert/TB survivors and in total, 86 target participants were trained in Lira and Masaka Venues from September 20th-23rd, 2021. There were 39 TB survivors and 47 CSO representatives that formed the 86 participants trained.
- The trained Expert/TB survivors were empowered to do start involving themselves in TB community work that include sensitize communities, facilitate TB case finding, follow up of patients and reporting.

Community mobilization and Advocacy campaigns especially World TB day event.

Support mobilization of political and local leadership and support them advocate for TB funding at central, regional and district levels


This intervention aimed at engaging key decision makers; political, religious, cultural and local leaders into understanding the dynamics around the TB disease, with major target of ensuring that they are well informed to make informed decisions that can impact on the improved local resource allocations to TB management in the country. Al total of 13 regional level meetings were held with the details shown in the table below:

These meeting target were 40 participants for each region, but each region greatly mobilize their leaders and they were fully in attendance.

Some of the follow up planned activities for this intervention

- There should be massive involvement of private health providers in the TB screenings, care and prevention. This should be in their implementation approaches.
- The District and IPs should address the challenges associated with lack of supplies and equipments that greatly affect TB services in all cascades.
- The IPs in the region should demonstrate stability and reliability in supporting the districts equally. This should be backed up by the political support and coordinated oversight supervisions.
- The TB community campaigns should include VHTs and facility health workers so that their inputs into the TB programming are clear and measurable.
- The strategy for district lead programming should be strengthened as opposed to IP lead programing.
- The regions expect that the local leaders put to task the poorly performing facilities and districts so that they don't lower the performance of the region. In some regions, the chairpersons expect that the poorly performing district staff be put on PIP to ensure they are closely supported and monitored based on agreed indicators.
- There were also commitments to have TB activities integrated into other disease programing, including more TB awareness in the local radio airtime, churches and in the community gatherings.

• There were a number of commitments by leaders to ensure more local budget allocation for TB disease. This remains to be seen in the 2022 TB reflections in the budget framework paper.

Synergy/Collaborative review meetings for ACSM, M&E/Research, TB/HIV, working groups to enhance TB programming

This is one of the avenues for partner coordination meetings are meant to bring together entities supporting and/or implementing TB activities in the various areas of the country.

By implementation design, there are three working groups here that include

- i. ACSM
- ii. M&E/Research
- iii. TB/HIV

Each of these working groups has a chairperson with the respective members and they have the TORs that are there to guide their performance measurements. Each working groups are expected to hold a quarterly meeting so as to strengthen collaborative programming for TB interventions in the country.

There were at least two meetings held by each of these working groups in the year 2021 with 80 members/partners engaged. Their engagements greatly guided USTP programming and coordination functions.

The Parliamentary TB caucus meeting to draft a resolution to advocate for enacting of a law that promotes and protects the rights of people with TB including social protection.

This intervention is expected to orchestrate or give birth to the Parliamentary resolution to the speaker of Parliament with the Rights of people with TB put on the agenda. The issues of importance discussed include a lot of expenses TB patients goes through once they contract TB disease, the poor nutrition support due to the fact that most TB patients are poor, no social protection policy in place that can support the TB patients, the lack of protective policy against stigmatization of the TB patients and poor prioritization the other TB related issues including limited budget allocation from national budget framework paper, unfavourable job security for working TB patients, among others.

In the meeting many presentations were made as outlined above, but above all, the key ways forward was agreed upon:

From the parliamentary motion moved in the 10^{th} Parliament by Hon. Dr. Akamba Muwuma who moved the private members bill on health, he is to be supported to move the motion again in this 11^{th} Parliament. Necessary preparations with the gaps to be bridged has to be clearly outlined


before this improved motion goes to parliament so that it's not rejected – this will be spearheaded by Hon. Joel Ssebikaali.

There should be the write up about all the details we want included about TB including urging government to improve on funding and other interventions – provide statistics indicating the current status. The write up should be policy friendly that would be used to form the draft of a motion. The policy brief should capture the funding gap and challenges facing people with TB and this areas will be spearheaded by Dr. Isiko Paul

The other action point was to identify someone/partner to orient MPs on the public health act and how best the MPs can take up this details. There's need to organize a bigger meeting that would invite more MPs who can defend the motion once moved – meeting to be organized by USTP, though the timeline is not set, but this should be before September, 2022

Position the country-level platform as a strategic leader and key convener on TB

This intervention is aimed at enhancing the TB awareness especially during the world TB day period through the use of digital media to enhance USTP advocacy communication awareness and also conducting the media conference on the eve of World TB day which will surely be carried out in the month of March, 2022. On the digital media usage, USTP is active on social media and the updates through different social media platforms are very current as evidence in the website, Facebook and twitter channels.

The TB sensitization meeting workshop:

This sensitization meeting targeted the journalists from different houses and Media team activists. It also included the knowledge updates and TB experiences sharing.

Among the key issues from this meeting were the following:

- There was request for support to the journalists to be able to do investigative stories about TB from media grant (if the media grant is supported by USTP)
- Some media houses promised to offer free opinion articles for TB like new vision, Fresh TV and Bukedde TV.

TB CONSTITUENCY ENGAGEMENT MEETINGS

The Uganda Country Coordinating Mechanism (UCCM) of the Global Fund, supports its constituencies including among others the TB, HIV and Malaria constituencies to hold meetings with their constituency members and address issues pertaining to the control of the 3 diseases in the country. Through these meetings, participants are not only updated on the Global Fund processes and running grants, but they also get an opportunity to discuss successes, opportunities and challenges in regard to HIV, TB and Malaria activities and services supported by the Global Fund. There were three TB Constituency engagement meetings coordinated by USTP during the year 2021 with details in the table below:

The TB constituency engagements key priorities in the year 2021

- a) Identified TB Constituency Priorities for the C-19 Response Mechanism GF Grant Application for April 2021. The key focus areas included;
 - Building capacity for community structures to respond to C-19, especially
 mobilizing communities for C-19 vaccination. There will be engagement of
 various media categories and other stakeholders such as community, cultural,
 religious and other leaders
 - Supporting TB services continuity in the community especially supporting differentiated services models and adherence Enablers
 - Carrying out Social science research on C-19 especially finding how communities can take part in offering local solutions to support the control of the four diseases (TB, HIV, malaria and C-19
 - Supporting C-19/TB bi-directional screening; Cartridges for GeneXpert
 which would cover needs for both TB and C-19 and also support accreditation of
 more facilities
 - Design and implement interventions to fight TB/C-19 associated stigma as well as offering psychosocial and peer support. This is expected to go a long way in ensuring health services seeking
- b) Orienting new members about TB constituency, CCM and GF processes.

- This included progress updates of the NFM-3 implementations and the intervention areas
- Feedback on impact of C-19 on the service deliveries specific to TB
- Strengthening grant oversight through the use of community-based monitoring tools
- c) To discuss avenues of engaging TB survivor more effectively
- d) Contribute to the development of the CCM Constituency Advocacy plan
- e) To review the current state of activity implementation in the face of the C-19 pandemic

Maintaining coordination between USTP and NTLP

USTP continued to work with the NTLP through the weekly, monthly, quarterly and annual planning meetings to review activity implementation plan and updates from activities implemented. Participation in these meetings have helps to nurture a harmonious working relationship between NTLP, USTP and other key stakeholders. It also allows for liaison between the various public and private players in TB care and control. The weekly meetings are held every Monday from 10am and the chairperson, normally Dr. Luzze from NTLD guides the meeting with support from the program manager Dr. Stavia. Most of these meetings are held via zoom platform. At the end of the quarter, there are performance reviews from all the 17 DR-TB regions of the country.

Coordination activities with stakeholders

In addition, it was also seen fit to meet with regional and other IPs involved in the TB fight for effective coordination so to identify potential areas where conflict of interest, duplication of efforts, among other issues, could arise. Among the IPs met in the coordination meetings were Defeat TB, RHITES-N Acholi, RHITES-N Lango, RHITES-EC, RHITES-E, RHITES-SW, IDI-Hoima, IDI-Arua and RHSP (Masaka Region). These meetings helped guide the way USTP planned and implemented its activities throughout 2021.

The USTP Board Meetings

There were a number of USTP Board meetings that were held 2021, with a target of a meeting planned for every quarter. During the year, all the board meetings including the working groups, were conducted virtually on zoom platform.

RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

During the year, USTP was able to get resources for its operation from GF through TASO GMU. This grant, called NFM-3 was awarded in the month of January 2021 and this was done formally through a signed MOU between USTP and TASO Uganda Ltd, for the 3-year grant implementation period.

USTP was also able to mobilize other resources from Global Stop TB Partnership to support mainly the advocacy related interventions relating to TB. A Total of \$55000 was awarded to USTP for a planned 8-month implementation period, starting July 2021 through to March 2022. USTP kick-started the implementation of this grant activities in the year 2021

DATA MANAGEMENT, MONITORING AND EVALUATION

The reporting period, M&E unit was engaged in a number of activities:

- Finalizing the budget, workplan and the implementation approach for the NFM-3 grant
- Consolidating the procurement plan for the NFM-3 grant, specifically extracting and populating the detailed of the procurement plan for 2021
- Compilations of the reports for the previous grant (NFM-2) whose implementations ended in December 2020. These included Oct-Dec 2020 report and the Annual report for the funding mechanism
- M&E unit was also engaged in the direct activity implementations including supporting the implementation of the following interventions:
 - ✓ The preparatory meetings and the actual participation in the WTD event in Moroto in March 24th, 2021
 - ✓ Supporting the procurement activities relating to WTD: T-shirts, calendars, branded pens, banners, venues, vehicle hire, PPEs for C-19 preventions among others.
 - ✓ CSO and TB survivor initial mentorship visits that targeted the selection from the 17 MDR-TB regions of the country.
 - ✓ PPM mentorship visits, where two mentorship support visits were carried out
 - ✓ Weekly planning and updated meetings with NTLP and other stakeholders. In this platform, the key activities of USTP that involve other NTLP and other regional and District stakeholders are shared and agreed upon
 - ✓ The regional TB advocacy meetings where in the year 13 meetings were coordinated. These meetings was really intensive from the preparation stages, right to its execution.
 - ✓ The working group meetings for ACSM, M&E and TB/HIV.

- ✓ UNOPs grant writing: Workplan, Gantt chart and support to its activity implementations.
- ✓ M&E has also been engaged in the staff and program meeting that are held on weekly and on monthly basis. In this meetings reports are reviewed for data accuracy, consistencies and quality control.
- ✓ The performance reviews with TASO-GMU and NTLP

Support by TASO GMU Technical team

As part of the support to USTP implementation of NTM-3, TASO GMU technical team held a meeting with USTP on Feb 1, 2021 at TASO GMU, with focus on the key areas that needed management attention of USTP right from NFM-2 implementation executed. Some of the key things pointed out included streamlining the following issues:

- ✓ Strengthening Governance and Leadership function of USTP SMT/Board
- ✓ Putting more emphasis on matters of strategic importance that these should be discussed by the board and Partners Forum as guided by the constitution of USTP
- ✓ The implementation of mandate should be key in USTP implementation details as stipulated in the NSP in place. Some of the USTP mandate includes; coordination, oversight and sharing of information among partners (agencies and stakeholders in TB work)
- ✓ The then operational manual was not aligned to board roles as stipulated in the constitution.
- ✓ Resource mobilization gaps: the draft resource mobilization plan 2017-2020 was of poor quality, had weak strategies to guide achievement of intended. This needed urgent updates to reflect the current resource mobilization demand
- ✓ There was also the issue of over-reliance on once donor (GF). This should be critically addressed.

The other technical areas provided by TASO GMU in the year included here:

a. The M&E Data Validation support


The data validation support from the M&E department was conducted on 20th January, 2021.

The visiting team noted that the data accuracy had improved to more than 90%, with few areas requiring further actions to reduce on the 10% data issues.

The key data quality issues pointed for improvement included:

- i. Data entry completeness for all variables captured and reported on
- ii. It was noted that some field team struggle with understanding the data capture and reporting tools. More field technical support was recommended, though the period was where C-19 lockdown was all over the country
- iii. It was noted that there were few TB screening cases as tracked from the TB contact tracing tools completed from the community. The field team were to be supported to ensure more household contacts are screened for TB and their details captured in the tools at their disposal.
- iv. It was also noted that some field team do not complete the daily attendance forms as they do TB contact tracing.
- v. There was one case in Jinja District where very many contacts were screened. It needed field verification to ascertain what kind of household setting it was which had more than 30 contacts. The phone

- follow up indicated that most of the contacts was in a busy market area there the TB index patient was operating.
- vi. Some TB index patients were sharing registration numbers from health facility TB registers. This could make it hard to map them for field support. The affected facility team were to be reached to ensure they know about this data inconsistencies and remedies made.

b. Review of NFM-3 grant Budget, workplan and implementation details

There were several scheduled meetings with TASO GMU technical team on ensuring that the NFM-3 implementation details were well documented and understood.

- ✓ These meetings included visiting TASO Kanyanya centre for a physical meeting with the technical team for this direct technical support for the new grant. This was held on 13th Feb, 2021. The subsequent meetings were held at TASO GMU in the months of February, 2021.
- ✓ There were also Introduction and high-level orientation of SRs. The NFM-3 SRs were all in a meeting organized by PR2 who also ensured NTLP was engaged so that they get to know the details of the SRs implementing NFM-3 across different intervention areas and their geographical coverage. Some of the SRs introduced were: USTP, CEHURD, Baylor Uganda, PACE, UDHA, UHRNETWORK, NAFOPHANU and UGANET among others

Contributing to the writing of the NTLP Annual Report 2021/2022

Over this same period USTP contributed to the production of a few outputs under the NTLP including reviewing policy documents as well as contributing to periodic publication.

USTP greatly participate in all core NTLP programming, weekly, quarterly and annual reportings

- The involvement are so significant in the streamlining the interventions of the civil society, the community and private health providers into the TB prevention and treatment.
- Technical inputs into the capacity building of CSOs and TB survivors where the trainings were carried out with greater engagement of NTLP, MOGLSD and other stakeholders from among the partners of USTP.

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FINANCE, ADMINISTRATION AND HUMAN RESOURCE

During the year, USTP welcomed the external auditors from Engaged Partners and also the compliant personnel from TASO GMU and. There was also support supervision provided by compliance and M&E personnel from TASO GMU. They helped in guiding the operations of USTP with the findings shared.

Fund release for the Activities

The funds for activities were released on a quarterly basis. The working mode due to covid-19 greatly affected some activity implementation approaches. Some meetings and workshops had to be conducted scientifically instead of the usual physical representations. The World TB day event for example, was greatly affected.

Procurement and Logistics Management

There were a number of procurements undertaken during the year 2021 including:

- The IEC materials for world TB day event –T-shirts, burners, caps, calendars, car stickers among others
- The meeting venues and hire of vehicles for field activities
- The PPEs for C-19 including facemasks and sanitizers

Human resources

There were no new recruitments during the year. The existing staff were all available in the year, and all worked as per the existing HR policy of USTP and GOU.

The operation policy manuals

A number of policy documents to guide the day to day running of USTP were finalised in the year including

- The finance and operation manual
- The human resource and operation manual
- The procurement manual

Since these manuals were approved, it greatly guided the undertakings of USTP in the year 2021

Capacity Building through CME/CPD

The team held a number of continuous professional development meetings so as to have more understandings of HR and Finance policies for its staff members. This is to ensure strict adherence to the SOPs, policies, rules and the organization norms. USTP takes this event very seriously because it is the avenue for enlightening her staff on the key changes in the policies and changes in SOPs and guidelines. The zoom/virtual platform made technical capacity building fairly simple especially in situations where some members were not physically in the office due to C-19,

The external audit exercise of USTP

This was carried out in the month of April 2021 from 8^{th} - 22^{nd} the findings were shared with the USTP team and other concerned parties.
